My apprenticeship

In 2021, I began my Laboratory Scientist (Chemical Science) Degree Apprenticeship at Stepan and the Manchester Metropolitan University. It was in the same year that I received funding from the Royal Society of Chemistry's Inclusion and Diversity Fund to establish a network for disabled scientists, Enable Science.

Whilst Degree Apprenticeships are becoming increasingly popular, they are still considered a non-traditional route into science. This seems particularly appropriate for me given that me interest in science developed somewhat non-traditionally.

Science never really interested me in school, and I initially did not pursue it post-GCSE. I, however, decided to change degree pathway from Environmental Science to Chemistry when I came to the realisation that I most enjoyed the chemistry components of Environmental Science. This was because I was given the freedom to explore science at my own place, in a context that captured my interest. In addition, science was now about asking questions and seeking answers, instead of learning facts and theories.

Prior to undertaking my Degree Apprenticeship, I worked within laboratories and began to question my place in science. I encountered toxic workplaces, pressure to ignore work-life balance and sacrifice health, and disability discrimination. I was incredibly lucky that, at this time, I was able to participate in the Royal Society of Chemistry's A Sense of Belonging in the Chemical Sciences focus group. The focus group allowed me to connect with role models that helped me to come to terms with my experiences and to visualise a way forward. Not long after, I became a Degree Apprentice.

This offered an opportunity for support from both my employer and my degree provider, and provided reassurance as the partnership enables both parties to be held accountable to each other. I have also been able to relate the theory I am learning to my work, providing the context to aid my understanding and ignite my interest. In addition, I have been able to expand my network and meet many more role models to inspire me, including my colleagues, my fellow apprentices, my lecturers, and the people I have met through my voluntary work with DAN, Enable Science, and the Chemical Industries Association's ChemTalent Network.

You may wonder why I am sharing this with you. On International Women's Day, I listened to Dr Katie King's keynote speech at the University of Manchester. I was fascinated by Dr King's career. It surprised me to hear of the challenges and subjective failures along the way, which highlighted that success is not an end goal but rather a journey. This resonated with me as a mature student at my third university and working towards my first degree.

I feel that my apprenticeship is allowing me to make up for some of the time I lost due to my disability. I can be financially independent without sacrificing my opportunity to study and find a career that I am passionate about.



Although awareness and uptake of Degree Apprentices is increasing amongst college-leavers, I wanted to highlight that, if like myself, your life journey has left you looking to make a career change or study later in life, Degree Apprenticeships are for you too.

Renewal




